## Spanish Education Emphasis, BA

## Program Description

The Secondary Education emphasis in Spanish at Utah Tech allows students to immerse themselves in any Spanish-speaking culture. They will be able to use these necessary skills for research, translating and teaching not only the language, but also the literature and the culture of Spanishspeaking country. Traditionally, Spanish major students work as elementary or secondary education teachers. Our location in Utah, a state that is a pioneer in Dual Language Immersion, makes our program a great recruitment place for school districts, not only in our state, but also across the country.

## Professional Licensure/Certification (PLC) Requirements

The curriculum for programs at Utah Tech University leading to professional licensure are designed to prepare students for Utah licensure and certification requirements. Admission into programs for professions requiring licensure and certification does not guarantee that students will obtain a license or certificate. ## Introductory Information to Spanish Degree

Students can begin taking the required courses for the Spanish major in one of three ways:

1. By beginning with any of the lower division courses (SPAN 1010, 1020, 2010, or 2020), depending on a student's background. Students who begin with 1020, 2010, or 2020 may receive vertical credits for the lower classes, if needed, according to policy.
2. By beginning with SPAN 3010 for heritage Spanish speakers ${ }^{1}$. If needed, students can receive vertical credits for the classes skipped, according to policy (catalog.utahtech.edu/academicpoliciesandprocedures/\#extrainstitutionalcredittext).
3. By beginning with SPAN 3060 for native speakers ${ }^{1}$ or students who have lived in a Spanish speaking environment for 1.5 years or more. If needed, students can receive vertical credits for the classes skipped, according to policy.

The Bachelor of Arts foreign language requirement may be filled with any of these three options as soon as the student receives credit for either SPAN 2020 or SPAN 3060.

Placement in foreign language classes is at the discretion of the Department Chair.

To be admitted to the Secondary Education Program and enroll in professional courses:

- USBE R277-504-3 $A(3)$ "requires candidates to maintain a cumulative university GPA of 3.0, and receive a $C$ or better in all education related courses and major required content courses"
and students must pass the appropriate PRAXIS II content area subject test(s). In addition, one of the following must be completed:
- Students with BA/BS degrees in progress must have completed at least $95 \%$ of major coursework and have approval of major academic content area department advisor
- Students with completed BA/BS or higher degrees must have their transcripts reviewed by content area department advisor

## Graduation Requirements
